Names of God Bible

*³³ But first, be concerned about his kingdom and what has his approval.
Then all these things will be provided for you.*

The words above are written within the New Testament and are spoken of by the character Jesus Christ. This is the entire purpose of the Holy Scriptures and the message that God wants to provide for all the chosen ones throughout the

world. When God first came up with the idea to write to humans the overall theme was to teach about salvation and how God intended to administer salvation to people. In addressing the issue of God's kingdom we will expound its purpose and the information within the Bible that tells us the teaching from God that explains salvation. In first off focusing on the chosen ones, how does the Bible relay the overall relationship that has been developed over time with God by using the Bible? At *Psalms 119:39-48 (Easy-to-Read Version)*

³⁹ Take away the shame I fear.

Your laws are good.

⁴⁰ See how much I want to obey your instructions!

Be good to me, and let me live.

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⁴¹ LORD, show me your faithful love.

Save me, as you promised.

*⁴² Then I will have an answer for those who make fun of me
for trusting what you say.*

⁴³ Let me always say what is true.

I depend on your judgment to be fair.

⁴⁴ I will follow your teachings forever and ever.

⁴⁵ So I will live in freedom,

because I do my best to know your instructions.

*⁴⁶ I will discuss your rules with kings,
and no one will embarrass me.*

*⁴⁷ What joy your commands give me!
How I love them!*

*⁴⁸ Not only do I love your commands, but I also honor them.
I will study your laws.*

In the New Testament the word of Jesus Christ reflect and teach divinity to all and shows to humans the correct way to approach worship of God in any way. In request of God's promise to save people from their sins and provide a savior what passage in the Bible helps all to focus on the will of God? At *Mark 8:34-38 (Living Bible)* ³⁴ *Then he called his disciples and the crowds to come over and listen. "If any of you wants to be my follower," he told them, "you must put aside your own pleasures and shoulder your cross, and follow me closely.* ³⁵ *If you insist on saving your life, you will lose it. Only those who throw away their lives for my sake and for the sake of the Good News will ever know what it means to really live.* ³⁶ *"And how does a man benefit if he gains the whole world and loses his soul in the process?"* ³⁷ *For is anything worth more than his soul?* ³⁸ *And anyone who is ashamed of me and my message in these days of unbelief and sin, I, the Messiah, will be ashamed of him when I return in the glory of my Father, with the holy angels."* The key point in the passage explains that if we want to be followers of Jesus Christ our Lord we must conquer human nature and focus on divine instructions within the Bible. We should copy exactly whatever we

perceive Jesus Christ doing. The passage also relays the words of the Messiah as directly speaking to all that read the words within the Bible: If you are ashamed of me then I will also be ashamed of you. So how should faithful Christian believe and support the Good News? At *1 Corinthians 1:18-21 (Living Bible)* ¹⁸ *I know very well how foolish it sounds to those who are lost, when they hear that Jesus died to save them. But we who are saved* recognize this message as the very power of God.* ¹⁹ *For God says, "I will destroy all human plans of salvation no matter how wise they seem to be, and ignore the best ideas of men, even the most brilliant of them."* ²⁰ *So what about these wise men, these scholars, these brilliant debaters of this world's great affairs? God has made them all look foolish and shown their wisdom to be useless nonsense.* ²¹ *For God in his wisdom saw to it that the world would never find God through human brilliance, and then he stepped in and saved all those who believed his message, which the world calls foolish and silly.* What additional information can we find in the Bible? At *Hebrews 11:6 (Easy-to-Read Version)* ⁶ *Without faith no one can please God. Whoever comes to God must believe that he is real and that he rewards those who sincerely try to find him.*

The Bible tells us that Jesus Christ lived a certain lifestyle that was called The Way Acts 19:9, how does the Bible explain the purpose of the character Jesus Christ? At *Acts 3:19-26 (Easy-to-Read Version)* ¹⁹ *So you must change your hearts and lives. Come back to God, and he will forgive your sins.* ²⁰ *Then the Lord will give you times of spiritual rest. He will send you Jesus, the one he chose to be the*

Messiah. ²¹ "But Jesus must stay in heaven until the time when all things will be made right again. God told about this time when he spoke long ago through his holy prophets. ²² Moses said, 'The Lord your God will give you a prophet. That prophet will come from among your own people. He will be like me. You must obey everything he tells you. ²³ And anyone who refuses to obey that prophet will die, separated from God's people.' ²⁴ "Samuel, and all the other prophets who spoke for God after Samuel, said that this time would come. ²⁵ And what those prophets talked about is for you, their descendants. You have received the agreement that God made with your fathers. God said to your father Abraham, 'Every nation on earth will be blessed through your descendants.' ²⁶ God has sent his special servant Jesus. He sent him to you first. He sent him to bless you by causing each of you to turn away from your evil ways." The key point explained in this passage is that: *He will send you Jesus, the one he chose to be the Messiah.* So purpose of Jesus Christ is the long awaited Messiah/Christ in which God made the important decision for all humans on earth to follow this one. In the dictionary the word *Messiah* = 1. *The promised deliverer of the Jewish nation prophesied in the Hebrew Bible. Jesus regarded by Christians as the Messiah of the Hebrew prophecies and the savior of humankind.* 2. *A leader or savior of a particular group or cause. This is the Christian explanation of the Hebrew term. Who is Messiah in Islam? In the Quran, Jesus is described as the Messiah (al-Masīḥ), born of a virgin,*

performing miracles, accompanied by disciples, rejected by the Jewish establishment, and being raised to heaven. The Quran asserts that Jesus wasn't crucified nor died on the cross, but was miraculously saved by God. This term can be cleaned up by using the Holy Scriptures for the accurate terminology that is from God. Since the world have several different holy books all claiming to be from God the right one must be established to define spiritual matters as a message from Almighty God. What additional information can we find in the Holy Scriptures? At *Romans 3:21-26 (Easy-to-Read Version) How God Makes People Right* ²¹ But God has a way to make people right, and it has nothing to do with the law. He has now shown us that new way, which the law and the prophets told us about. ²² God makes people right through their faith in ^[a] Jesus Christ. He does this for all who believe in Christ. Everyone is the same. ²³ All have sinned and are not good enough to share God's divine greatness. ²⁴ They are made right with God by his grace. This is a free gift. They are made right with God by being made free from sin through Jesus Christ. ²⁵⁻²⁶ God gave Jesus as a way to forgive people's sins through their faith in him. God can forgive them because the blood sacrifice of Jesus pays for their sins. God gave Jesus to show that he always does what is right and fair. He was right in the past when he was patient and did not punish people for their sins. And in our own time he still does what is right. God worked all this out in a way that allows him to judge people fairly and still make right any person who has faith in Jesus. How does the Bible express the Character Jesus Christ and his role as

the Messiah/Christ? At *John 3:31-36 (Easy-to-Read Version)* ***The One Who Comes From Heaven***³¹ "The one who comes from above is greater than all others. The one who is from the earth belongs to the earth. He talks about things that are on the earth. But the one who comes from heaven is greater than all others.³² He tells what he has seen and heard, but people don't accept what he says.³³ Whoever accepts what he says has given proof that God speaks the truth.³⁴ God sent him, and he tells people what God says. God gives him the Spirit fully.³⁵ The Father loves the Son and has given him power over everything.³⁶ Whoever believes in the Son has eternal life. But those who do not obey the Son will never have that life. They cannot get away from God's anger."

As Judgment Day proceeds what passage in the Bible expresses the general mentality of those chosen as Sons of God? At *Philippians 3:4-11 (Easy-to-Read Version)*⁴ Even if I am able to trust in myself, still I don't do it. If anyone else thinks they have a reason to trust in themselves, they should know that I have a greater reason for doing so.⁵ I was circumcised on the eighth day after my birth. I am from the people of Israel and the tribe of Benjamin. I am a true Jew, and so were my parents. The law was very important to me. That is why I became a Pharisee.⁶ I was so eager to defend my religion that I persecuted the church. And no one could find fault with the way I obeyed the Law of Moses.⁷ At one time all these things were important to me. But because of Christ, I decided that they are worth nothing.⁸ Not only these things, but now I think that all things are worth nothing compared with the greatness of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. Because of Christ, I lost all these things, and now I know that they are all worthless trash. All I want now is Christ.⁹ I want to belong to him. In Christ I am right with God, but my being right does not come from

following the law. It comes from God through faith. God uses my faith in Christ to make me right with him.¹⁰ All I want is to know Christ and the power that raised him from death. I want to share in his sufferings and be like him even in his death. "Then there is hope that I myself will somehow be raised from death. By using this example within the Bible we can always understand the Chosen Ones relay on God in everything they do. In contrast to the example above, what passage also shows us the lifestyle of sinners in general? At *Habakkuk 2:4-8* (*Names of God Bible*)

⁴ "Look at the proud person. He is not right in himself.
But the righteous person will live because of his faithfulness.

⁵ Also because wine is treacherous
he is arrogant and never rests.
He has a large appetite like the grave.
He is like death—never satisfied.
He gathers all the nations to himself.
He collects all the people to himself.

⁶ Won't all of them ridicule him,
directing clever sayings and riddles at him, like:

"How horrible it will be for the one who makes himself rich
with what is not his own
and makes himself wealthy on loans.
How long will this go on?"

⁷ Won't your creditors suddenly rise up

and those who are going to shake you wake up?

Then you will become their prize.

⁸ You have looted many nations.

*All the rest of the people will loot you
because of the slaughter and violence done
to lands, cities, and all their inhabitants.*

In concluding this address what passage in the Bible explains the arrangement for salvation before the arrival of Jesus Christ our Lord? At *Galatians 3:10-14 (Easy-to-Read Version)*

¹⁰ But people who depend on following the law to make them right are under a curse. As the Scriptures say, "They must do everything that is written in the law. If they do not always obey, they are under a curse." ¹¹ So it is clear that no one can be made right with God by the law. The Scriptures say, "The one who is right with God by faith will live forever." ¹² The law does not depend on faith. No, it says that the only way a person will find life by the law is to obey its commands. ¹³ The law says we are under a curse for not always obeying it. But Christ took away that curse. He changed places with us and put himself under that curse. The Scriptures say, "Anyone who is hung on a tree is under a curse." ¹⁴ Because of what Jesus Christ did, the blessing God promised to Abraham was given to all people. Christ died so that by believing in him we could have the Spirit that God promised.

The key point in this passage explains the requirements of the Mosaic Law being that a penalty of death is established for anyone that cannot fulfill the law exactly. This was used as a teaching mode that expresses the life and role of Jesus

Christ in relation towards salvation given to all obedient servants. In closing this address and acknowledging divine teachings in relation to Jesus Christ as our savior what passage in the Bible tells us the overall condition that God

will provide salvation to all? At *Hebrews 10:38-39 (Living Bible)*

³⁸And those whose faith has made them good in God's sight must live by faith, trusting him in everything. Otherwise, if they shrink back, God will have no pleasure in them. ³⁹But we have never turned our backs on God and sealed our fate. No, our faith in him assures our souls' salvation.
